On behalf of the more than 14,000 members of the National Association of Manufacturers (NAM), the largest manufacturing association in the United States representing manufacturers in every industrial sector and in all 50 states, I am writing on the January 2017 green paper entitled "Fostering the Advancement of the Internet of Things" written by the Internet Policy Task Force and Digital Economy Leadership Team of the Department of Commerce.

The green paper is an analysis based on comments submitted in response to an April 2016 Request for Comment, "The Benefits, Challenges, and Potential Roles for the Government in Fostering the Advancement of the Internet of Things." The NAM submitted comments in June 2016 and we are pleased to see the interests of the manufacturing industry recognized throughout the green paper.
